### Themes of the Week

- The book of Psalms is the most ancient and poetic collection of songs and prayers; it is a guide for all believers.
- The presence of a book such as the Psalms, in the biblical collection, tells us how important was the spiritual and religious life of God's people millennia ago.
- From the Psalms we receive teachings and models regarding prayer, singing, praise, repentance and confession.
- The book of Psalms is one of the most cited of the Old Testament books within the New Testament.
- The Psalms make reference to important doctrines, even if these are not its primary scope.
